
Curacy Program Launched

At the last diocesan convention, Bishop Ketlen Solak announced the curacy program as part of her diocesan priorities. The curacy program is an opportunity for newly ordained clergy to serve the church and to continue their formation and training. The goals are to share the proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ, to form new clergy, to share the good news in word and action, to help develop




sustainable ministry and to grow as a learning community across the diocese as people work to support and encourage these newly ordained persons during their curacies. In June, the following four people were ordained to the transitional deaconate: Deanna Briody, Guy Brown, Jack Brownfield and Theodore Somes. Shortly after ordination, they began a 2-year curacy placement, respectively serving at Calvary, East Liberty, St. Thomas's, Oakmont, St. Michael's, Ligonier, and St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon, with the option of extending their curacy by an extra year.









Bishop Ketlen formed a working group to help launch the curacy program. This group included Catherine Brall, Noah Evans, Natalie Hall, Annis Rogers, Cameron Soulis, and Luke Zerra. This working group divided itself into two subgroups with Noah, Natalie and Luke working on site placement, and Catherine, Cameron, and Annis working on the formation program. Noah Evans and Cathy Brall steered the respective work of each subgroup.

Part of the task of the working group was to find suitable parish placements for each curate. The goal is for curates to meet regularly with the priests at the parishes where they are placed, and to also meet with assigned mentors, who are experienced priests in the diocese. In addition, the working group created a formation program meant to develop ministry competencies, which include preaching, teaching, pastoral care, sacramental leadership in celebrating the Eucharist, performing baptisms, funerals and weddings. The program is also designed to help curates develop work management skills, general parish administration, volunteer management, conflict resolution and basic crisis management. This is a continuation of their seminary training and growth in their understanding of what it means to be an ordained person in the Episcopal Church. Two of the most experienced priests in the diocese, Catherine Brall and Jonathon Jensen, are serving as facilitators of the formation aspect of the program.

The curacy program was carefully constructed by clergy who care deeply for the ongoing ministry of the diocese and are using their gifts to support its new clergy. Catherine Brall, who has an extensive background in ordination training for the diocese and who served as the Director of Field Education at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, remarks "I love training. I love formation of new clergy. I have personally supervised 20 some seminarians and many clergy, including new clergy as well, and continue to support them."



In reflecting on the curacy program, thus far, Noah Evans says, "It's my hope that a program like this is not just good for the clergy but is good for the entire diocese because it brings together so many people: the site supervisors, the newly ordained clergy, people who are leading the formation program, the people who are serving as mentors to these newly ordained clergy. My hope is that it creates a community of growth and formation because all of us are working together."


Sober Spirituality Book Study

Fall 2024 Anti-Racism Workshop



Seeing the Face of God in Each Other, our diocesan anti-racism workshop, is taking place online via Zoom **Friday, October 11, and Saturday, October 12, 2024.**

These two days offer a few hours to focus on the beauty and the scope of humanity in the Church and in our world, helping us to go beyond the biases we have that make us push people away, ignore them, or exert power over them—sometimes unwittingly—based only on their appearance. It will help you move more deeply into the mystery of the Body of Christ gathered *from every family, language, people and nation as a Kingdom of priests to serve our God.* (Revelation 5: 9-10)

Why would you want to take this workshop, at this time? Here are a few (but by no means all) reasons:

- God calls each one of us to love our neighbors as ourselves.
- Our nation is struggling with the impact of generations of systemic racism that affect everyone for the worse.
- We, as a diocese, have committed ourselves to a journey toward healing the wounds of racism in our region through the Beloved Community Initiative.
- As a diocese, we have also committed, by vote at diocesan convention, that all in leadership positions, in parishes or at the diocesan level, take the workshop as part of our responsibilities.
- There is always more to learn!

The Commission on Race and Reconciliation has significantly updated and reshaped the workshop for a virtual-reality online experience. If you have taken it in the past and think you could use a brush-up, it would be worth your time.

Our ministry in Christ is to love, to teach and to heal. This workshop will further equip us to be healers.


