

Ordination

The Rev. Jack Brownfield was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Ketlen on February 1, 2025. The service took place at St. Michael's of the Valley, Ligonier, where Jack serves as Curate.

New Call

The Rev. Chuck Weiss will serve as Interim Rector at Christ Church, North Hills, beginning March 1, 2025. He is returning to parish ministry on a part-time basis after retiring in June 2023. Fr. Chuck is a native Pittsburgher. Some may remember him from his years of previous lay and ordained ministry in our diocese, including as a youth minister at St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon; a director at Sheldon Calvary Camp; and the priest at St. Thomas', Canonsburg. Fr. Chuck most recently served a parish in Delaware, before returning to Pittsburgh with his wife Martha to be closer to family.

Retirement

The Rev. Canon Jim Shoucair retired from active ministry at the end of January. Canon Jim was ordained to the priesthood in 1999 and served as Rector of Christ Church, North Hills, since 2002. He plans to continue playing an active role in the life of the diocese.

Other Departures

The Rev. Catherine "Cat" Munz will end her time as Interim Priest at Church of the Nativity, Crafton, at the end of February. She has served in that capacity since July 2024 and is stepping away to resume her retirement-season travels. While Nativity searches for its next Priest-in-Charge, the Rev. Regis Smolko will serve the congregation as a regular supply priest.

The Rev. Dr. Bruce Robison will be stepping down from his role as Vicar of All Saints, Brighton Heights, at the end of February. He has served there since 2020. Bruce is considering this a "re-retirement"; he retired from active ministry and his role as Rector of St. Andrew's, Highland Park, in 2019. In the weeks ahead, **the Rev. Miguel Carmona** will be serving All Saints as a regular supply priest.


